

Dr.R.Satishkumar, Chairman, welcomed the gathering. Then all the points of agenda were taken up for discussion and after detailed discussion, the following resolutions were made by the members.

It is addressed that the issue of anti-ragging requires a multifaceted approach that involves various stakeholders such as educational institutions, students, faculty, and policymakers. The following points were discussed to curb anti-ragging in our institution.

- Stringent Policies and Enforcement: College must implement and rigorously enforce antiragging policies that clearly delineate what constitutes ragging, outline the consequences for such behavior, and establish accessible reporting channels.
- 2. **Educational Campaigns**: Regular awareness campaigns should be organized to educate students at College about the detrimental effects of ragging, the legal ramifications involved, and the importance of nurturing an atmosphere of mutual respect and dignity on campus.
- Orientation and Training Programs: Orientation sessions for incoming students and faculty members at Sengunthar Engineering College should include sensitization about the adverse impacts of ragging, emphasizing the significance of fostering a safe and inclusive campus environment.
- 4. Support Mechanisms for Students: College needs to establish robust support systems, such as counseling services, helplines, and mentorship programs, to provide assistance to victims of ragging and create a conducive environment for reporting incidents without fear of reprisal.
- Encouraging Peer Intervention: Students at Sengunthar Engineering College should be encouraged to intervene and support each other to prevent instances of ragging. Empowering students to speak up against such behavior fosters a culture of mutual support and accountability.
- Involvement of Parents: Engaging parents in Sengunthar Engineering College's anti-ragging
 efforts by informing them about institutional policies and encouraging discussions about the
 importance of respectful conduct reinforces the message both at home and within the college
 community.
- Collaboration with Authorities: Collaborating closely with law enforcement agencies ensures
 prompt investigation and appropriate action against instances of ragging at our campus sending a
 strong message that such behavior will not be tolerated.

- 8. Cultural Transformation: Our College should strive to cultivate a culture where ragging is unequivocally condemned, and mutual respect, tolerance, and inclusivity are actively promoted among students, faculty, and staff.
- Regular Evaluation and Monitoring: Establishing mechanisms for regular assessment and improvement of anti-ragging initiatives ensures that preventive measures remain effective and responsive to evolving challenges.
